How does student growth compare to other students?

Each student gets a student growth percentile (SGP) from 1 to 99 for English (4th to 8th grade) and Math (4th to 7th grade) that explains their progress compared to students who had similar test scores in the past.

If the student growth percentiles for all students in the district are ordered from smallest to largest, the median student growth percentile (mSGP) is the percentile in the middle of that list.

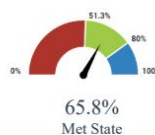

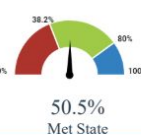
How did students perform on assessments?

This section shows the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations on statewide assessments (NJSLA and DLM). This percentage reflects the federal proficiency rate which makes adjustments to the proficiency rate if the participation rate was below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 10% of students. The chart indicates whether performance was above the state average or above the state's long-term goal of 80%.

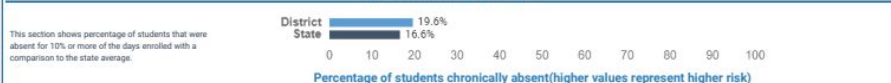

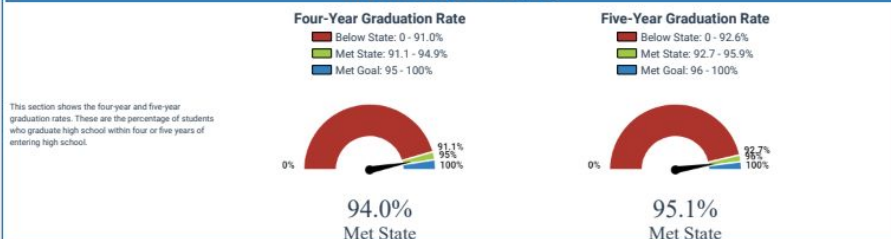

AP/IB Courses:

Percentage of 11th and 12th graders enrolled in one or more Advanced Placement (AP) or International Baccalaureate course (IB)



Dual Enrollment:

Percentage of 11th and 12th graders enrolled in one or more dual enrollment course, which is a course that allows high school students to enroll in college courses for credit prior to graduation



Industry-Valued Credentials:

Percentage of 9th-12th graders who earned one or more industry-valued credential during the school year. Industry-valued credentials are recognized degrees, diplomas, certificates, or certifications awarded for an occupation.



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English Language Arts Assessment - Participation and Performance



This table shows performance on statewide assessments for English language arts (ELA) both overall and by student group. It includes the results of students taking both the NJSLA and DLM. NJSLA results include only students in grades 3 through 9. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. Student are considered to have met or exceeded expectations if they score at Level 4 or 5 on the NJSLA or at Level 3 or 4 on the DLM.

This table shows both the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations and a proficiency rate used for federal accountability. The proficiency rate for federal accountability will be lower if the participation rate is below 95%. This table also shows progress towards meeting the state's long-term goal of 80% proficiency by 2032. Annual targets are specific to each subgroup, school, and district and represent the expected proficiency needed to stay on track to meet the state's long-term goal. Student groups where the annual target fields are grayed out are not required to meet annual targets under ESSA accountability. 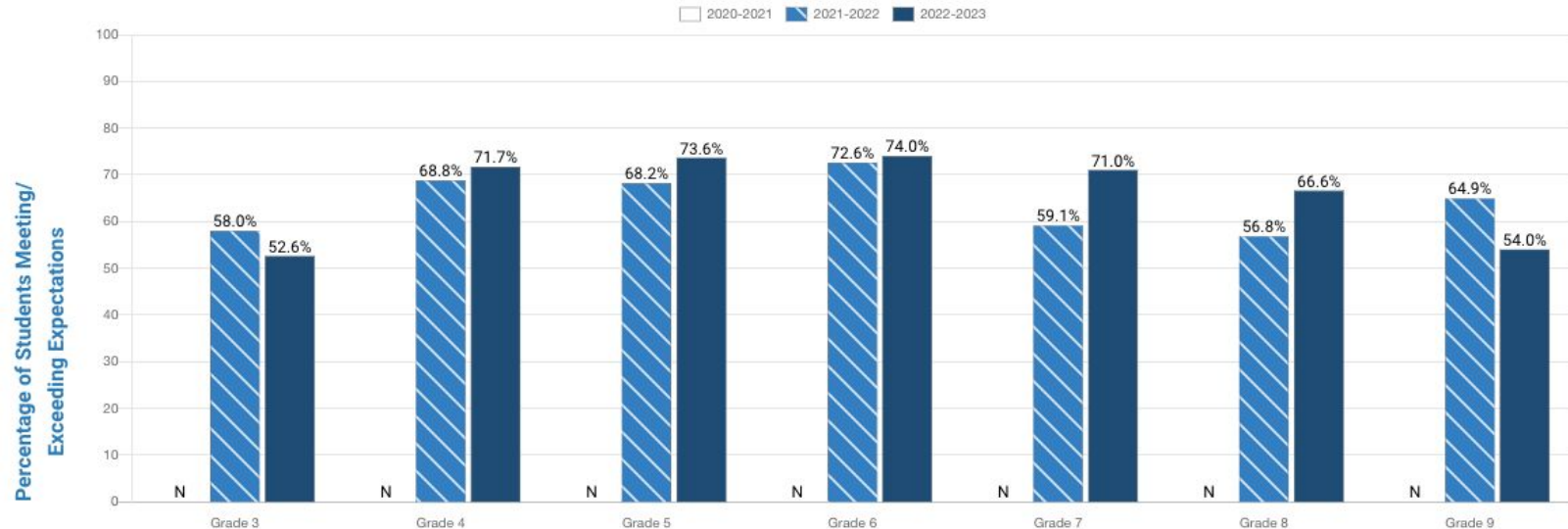

English Language Arts Assessment - Performance Trends



This graph shows the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations on each grade level exam on the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) for English Language Arts (ELA) for the past three years.

Important note for 2022-23: Due to the cancellation of statewide assessments in prior years, statewide assessment results are not available for the 2020-21 school year.



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Dual Enrollment Coursework - Participation



This graph shows the percentage of 11th and 12th graders who were enrolled in at least one dual enrollment course during the school year. Dual enrollment courses allow high school students to enroll in college courses for credit prior to their high school graduation.



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Advanced Coursework

Students in high schools begin to demonstrate college readiness behaviors long before they actually graduate from high school. These include participating in advanced course work such as **Advanced Placement (AP)** or **International Baccalaureate (IB)** courses and exams and **dual enrollment** courses where high school students can enroll in college courses for credit.

AP/IB Coursework – Participation and Performance



This chart shows the percentage of 11th and 12th graders who enrolled in one or more AP or IB courses, who took one or more AP or IB exams, and who had one or more exams with an AP score of 3 or higher or IB score of 4 or higher.

WIDA ACCESS 2.0 Data

ACCESS measures ELLs' abilities to understand and produce English used within school settings. The four sections of the test are Listening, Reading, Speaking, and Writing.

ACCESS meets U.S. federal requirements under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) for monitoring and reporting ELLs' progress toward English language proficiency.
