"I am deeply concerned that the recent Federal Court decision on the New Jersey Non-Public Elementary and Secondary Schools Act and the subsequent action of Commissioner Kilpatrick regarding local Board involvement with the auxiliary services aspect of the Act will offset the high quality of training offered to my child in St. Mary's School.

"Since the principle of supplying shared services was clearly defined under the Sills decision of 1965, I ask you to honor the contracts signed with the Remedial teachers and the forthcoming request of the joint Home and School Associations to provide the Speech Therapist and Remedial Reading teacher from local Board funds, "

## SECRETARY'S REPORT:

4.

Mr. Ramsland presented and read the following report:

"With the exception of one carpenter who has been spending full time at the Special Education Center, the maintenance department has been catching up on many small items of repair this past month. These include, but are not limited to, the following:

"At the high school the TV antenna which was causing leaks due to its installation on the roof, has been relocated to the side of the building and the roof repaired. Several sets of badly worn hinges have been replaced on the fire doors.

"At Franklin School some window guards have been installed at the rear of the school and three sets of broken gym bleachers have been repaired.

"At Lincoln School the roofing on the wooden shed has been replaced. It was necessary to replace rotted framing and roof boards as well as install a new roof covering.

"The first of three removable bookcases have been constructed and delivered to Washington School.

"Specifications have been prepared and are currently out for bid for re-roofing of Yantacaw School. These bids will be received next Tuesday.

"Miscellaneous steam, water and roof leaks have been repaired at Lincoln, Spring Garden, Yantacaw, Washington, and the high schools.

"Sixteen window panes have been replaced at Washington School and Yantacaw School during the past month, as well as forty pieces of plexiglass on the Lincoln School growing room. Last month thirty window panes were replaced at the various schools and at the present time there are approximately forty left to be replaced at Washington School, Radcliffe School and the high school.

"At the Park Oval the white risers of the concrete stands, which were in line with home plate and the pitcher's mound, have been repainted grey to reduce the glare which has been affecting the batters and catchers.

"A special word of appreciation should go to the Town's Water Department and the Roads and Sewer Department for the excellent cooperation which they exhibited in assisting for the better part of a full day in the isolation of a serious storm sewer problem at Franklin School. The correction of the problem will entail digging up and replacing a section of the storm sewer

line on the front lawn of this school and the construction of one or two manholes or cleanout stacks.

"A hearing held last Monday on the recent court decision which held that aid to non-public schools in the form of auxiliary services was unconstitutional, resulted in a modification of the court's decision. I spoke today with Dr. Walter McCarthy, of the Division of Field Services, Director of this program. He told me that letters are now going out which will authorize us to continue these services until the end of the current school year. We will, of course, comply with this most recent ruling.

"We received a memorandum from Dr. Kilpatrick, Acting Commissioner of Education, dated April 6, 1973, that ordered:

> 'All employment to perform auxiliary services in the non public schools under the Act (18A:58-59 et seq.) must be terminated immediately.'

"We complied with this order as directed, but the courts have since modified the order to permit 1972-73 contracts to be fulfilled. Although we have not received official word from Dr. Kilpatrick, we are optimistic that the auxiliary services that have been provided under the Act in question will be restored for the remainder of the current school year.

"The Nutley 1972-73 (fiscal year 1973) Title I allocation has been increased to \$25,850. The revised budget has been prepared and needs Board approval. As of this date, our 1972-73 application has not been acted upon.

"The Nutley High School cadet band is visiting Washington, D.C.

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April 27-28, 1973. They will perform on the steps of the Capitol on April 28. The Music Boosters Association is sponsoring this trip and they should be commended for the complete and effective planning that went into this project.

Dr. Fleischer stated that he would like to exercise his statutory rights on educational matters and give a statement on the above resolution.

"The fact that the football positions are listed as vacancies deserves an explanation. Since the end of the 1972 football season there have been occasions when the efficiency of the coaching staff was discussed.

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In retrospect it appears to us that the negative side of the problem has been more aggressively pursued than the positive, with the head coach bearing the brunt of the attack.

"On February 7, 1973, at the Athletic Committee meeting, this matter was discussed. It was the general consensus of the Board of Education at that time to re-appoint the present football staff. The administration was instructed to review the reservations about the program with head coach Federici. This was done.

"On April 16, 1973, the Athletic Committee unanimously approved the recommendations of the Superintendent for the 1973-74 athletic appointments. Included were the present football staff. At the Board of Education conference meeting held on April 18, 1973, the Board did not approve the Athletic Committee's recommendation in regard to the football staff.

"Mr. Federici was advised about the Board's action on April 19, 1973. He has since advised the Superintendent that he wishes to retire as head football coach because he does not wish to continue in this capacity without the confidence of the Board of Education.

"The Superintendent of Schools feels obligated, in light of these developments, to place on record the administration's strong feelings in regard to what is basically a personnel function of the administrative officers of the Board.

"It is a very difficult matter to objectively defend or oppose statements, conjecture and allegations about whether a coach is good, bad or indifferent. It is a very <u>easy</u> matter to express an opinion on either side, and as long as we recognize the difference between opinion and fact, we are not so apt to go wrong in a decision.

"It is customary to give weight to subjective opinion to the extent that the individual offering the opinion can qualify as having successful experience in the particular activity. Thus, if we were to pass an opinion on the merits of a bricklayer or a tailor, we might be expected to be told that we lacked the background to make a judgment. It is respectfully suggested that our collective background in interscholastic athletics is such that we should be granted the prerogative of presenting opinions which bear weight and which can be accepted with some credence.

- 1. It is believed that the moral and physical welfare of the individuals participating in interscholastic football in Nutley High School were protected greatly in excess of the median of our competition.
- 2. It is believed that the relationship existing between the coaching staff and the entire school program was excellent and is far in excess of the median of our competition.
- 3. It is believed that the competitive success of the interscholastic football teams in Nutley High School, considering the material and general working conditions, is in excess of the median of our competition.
- 4. In total characteristics, it is believed that the present Nutley High School football coaching staff operated with a degree of satisfaction considerably in excess of the median of our competition.

"It is our carefully considered professional judgment that there were no facts sufficient to warrant not renewing the contracts for the football staff for 1973. The Board of Education feels otherwise."

Mr. Piro commented that it is very difficult to put athletics in proper perspective when the administration sees fit to react so vigorously to what the Board has done. He believed it was the first time to his knowledge that the administration has taken such a step. At this time the administration asks the Board to accept its recommendation and not to do what its conscience dictates. The Board has a right to vote according to its conscience and not necessarily accept the recommendations of the administration. Mr. Piro ended by stating that in the future this Board, and all boards, will vote as their consciences dictate.

Mrs. Jaworek stated that she voted no on this resolution not because she was opposed to the appointments in the resolution but because of the vacancies listed specifically in the category of football. It is her carefully considered judgment that after examining all the facts and/or opinions presented to the Board, the 1972-1973 football coaching staff faithfully fulfilled its duties and obligations to the best of its ability and should have been included in the athletic appointment list presented for approval tonight.

#### NEW JERSEY STATE INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION:

Mr. Piro presented and moved the adoption of the following resolution, seconded by Mr. Cameron, and unanimously approved by the Board:

WHEREAS, the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association is a voluntary association of public, parochial and private schools in the State of New Jersey, and

WHEREAS, the said New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association has been dealing with the complex problems of regulating conduct of interscholastic athletic programs and interscholastic athletic tournaments in the State of New Jersey, and

WHEREAS, the said New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association is an affiliate of the National Federation of High School Athletic Associations, and

WHEREAS, in the past three years the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association and the public and private and parochial schools of New Jersey have been faced with the difficult problem of crowd control, and

WHEREAS, we recognize potential danger which violation of the rules of sportsmanship and fair play by coaches, athletes, spectators and officials has, and

WHEREAS, the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association has always afforded a full hearing and opportunity to be heard to any member school, athlete, coach or official whose conduct has been brought into question, and has fairly, impartially and promptly resolved the matter, and

WHEREAS, the prompt and firm resolution of complaints in connection with the conduct of coaches, athletes, spectators and officials often requires and has in the past required difficult decisions and the imposition of serious penalties against the offending parties, and

WHEREAS, without exception the courts of this State have uniformly upheld the decisions of the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association, and

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WHEREAS, it is our opinion that the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association has demonstrated clearly its ability and capacity to continue to manage and regulate interscholastic athletics between the public, private and parochial schools of the State of New Jersey,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Education of the Town of Nutley hereby commends the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association for its excellent conduct over the past many years,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Education of the Town of Nutley hereby publicly applauds the firm action which the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association has taken against offenders who have threatened disruption at athletic contests in New Jersey, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be forwarded to the New Jersey School Boards Association.

### OLD BUSINESS:

Mrs. Jaworek stated that a great honor had come to the Board of Education. Mrs. John Peddieson and Mr. Edward J. Lenihan were being honored as the two participants for the V. D. Mattia award for service to the community. She further commented that she was most happy to see that their chief service to the community had been as President and Vice-President to the Board of Education.

The question of the traffic at Radcliffe School was again brought before the Board and Mr. Ramsland indicated that he had had discussions with Chief Buel with regard to the situation. The remedy would involve removing various concrete curbs and paving, which work would be scheduled to be done during the summer.

Mr. Restaino raised the question regarding the use of the Spring Garden playground in the afternoons by Hoffmann-LaRoche employees. Mr. Ramsland stated that he was not aware of any permit being issued to Hoffmann-LaRoche and that he would check into the situation.
