Board of Education Nutley, New Jersey

May 22, 1974

The Regular Meeting of the Board of Education of the Town of Nutley, New Jersey, was held in the Nutley High School Auditorium, 300 Franklin Avenue, on Wednesday, May 22, 1974, at 8:00 p.m., with Mr. John E. Clayton, Jr., President, presiding.

FLAG SALUTE:

The meeting was opened with Mr. James M. Piro leading the Board members and citizens in the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag.

ROLL CALL:

The other members present at roll call were: Mr. Theodore J. Berger, Mr. Albert E. Cameron, Jr., Mrs. Thomas E. Jaworek, Mr. Walter Lindstrom, Mr. James M. Piro, Mrs. Edward M. Popadick, Mr. Gerard T. Restaino, and Mr. Frank V. Tangorra. Approximately 160 citizens present.

MINUTES:

Mr. Tangorra moved that the minutes be approved, seconded by Mrs. Popadick, and unanimously approved by the Board.

SECRETARY'S REPORT:

Mr. Ramsland presented and read the following report:

"I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Board of Education for the opportunity it afforded me to attend the annual meeting and conference of the New Jersey Association of School Business Administrators at Cherry Hill earlier this month. The formal program presentations and the informal

discussions and interchanges of ideas combined to make very worth-while the investment of two days' time.

"In addition to the annual business meeting of the association, the topics which were presented and discussed included OSHA and its effect on our schools, Thorough and Efficient, Cooperative and State Purchasing, Certification, Pensions, PPBS, and a discussion of recent developments within the State Department of Education as presented by Acting Commissioner Edward Kilpatrick.

"Meanwhile, back at the ranch, all the routine and not-so=routine work was being taken care of during this past month by our custodians, grounds crew, food service personnel, drivers, and office staff.

"Much of the work of the maintenance crew was also routine in nature, in that a number of window frames were repaired, 58 lights of window glass were replaced, door locks were repaired, plumbing fixtures were repaired, and drain stoppages were cleared.

"In addition to the above, which encompassed all the schools, an exhaust fan was installed, circulating pumps were rebuilt, and a fountain was replaced at the high school. At Washington School, a broken drain had to be dug up and replaced, and the area repaved. Work was started on the burned-out classroom at Yantacaw School, and the job of replacing the condensate return lines in the boiler room was completed.

"A new exterior door at the kindergarten at Spring Garden School was installed and the concrete steps to Spring Garden Place were repaired. At the Special Education Center new rain leaders were installed at the rear of the building, and the back porch was repaired and the deck replaced.

"The Music and Arts Festival held at Nutley High School on May 3rd was very successful. Personnel of both departments are to be commended for the diversified approaches to their subjects.

TEACHERS' SALARY GUIDE:

Mrs. Popadick presented and moved the adoption of the following resolution, seconded by Mr. Tangorra. Upon being put to a vote, motion was approved by a vote of 8 to 1, with Mr. Restaino casting the dissenting vote.

BE IT RESOLVED, That the attached Teachers' Salary Guide be adopted for the 1974-1975 School Year.

Mr. Restaino stated the following:

"During the last presentation of our budget many people asked that the Board of Education not forget the taxpayer during our salary negotiations with the teachers. There are people in Nutley that have lost their jobs, have been laid off and we have approximately 20% of our population that are senior citizens. These senior citizens remarked that years ago they purchased homes in Nutley because it was a beautiful town to live in; and with taxes so high 'Please don't force us to sell our houses and live in senior citizen villages by granting the teachers more raises.'. My answer at that time was: 'This is just one of the reasons why the Board has not settled with the teachers, we are thinking of the taxpayers.'

"As an educator I know that Nutley teachers will not be underpaid at \$19,425 for 18 years of service and 30 graduate points beyond a Masters. They will not be earning as much as some teachers in the surrounding communities but on the other hand they will be earning more than others.

"These are difficult times. I believe Nutley is still a beautiful town to live or teach in and we should all tighten our belts; this is not the time to try and keep pace with our neighbors. We are caught in a vicious circle that is slowly turning into a noose that will hurt everyone including our teachers. I have searched my conscience and I cannot justify the maximum of our guide at this time. My vote is NO."

Mr. Cameron commented that he had voted against the proposed salary guide at a conference meeting because he thought the Board could have maintained a more favorable settlement; however, in an effort to move closer to a unanimous agreement, and to show that he supported the position of the majority members of the Board on this important issue, he voted in favor of adopting the teachers' salary guide.



Mr. John Bresnahan, of 111 Ridge Road, reviewed his efforts during March and April to obtain the use of the Park Oval on Sunday mornings for a softball league. (His requests had been denied on two occasions because of the Board's policy of not permitting rental of the Park Oval before 2:00 p.m. on Sunday; however, the Board did relax its policy to permit use after 1:00 p.m.) Mr. Bresnahan then alleged that the use of the oval for a marathon softball game (running from Friday through Sunday) had been authorized on Monday, whereas the Board did not meet until Wednesday. He then raised two questions: (1) why was it authorized on Monday when the Board did not meet until Wednesday? and(2) why could he not have the field on Sunday mornings after precedent had been set?

Mr. Ramsland responded to the first question that it was <u>not</u> authorized on Monday; it was only requested on Monday. Nutley Sun reports notwithstanding, it was not authorized until Wednesday. To the second question he replied that the softball marathon was a high school related activity, not a rental of the field, was a special concession for a

specific event, and could not be considered as establishing a precedent.

The meeting was recessed by the Chairman who then introduced Dr. William Brooks, of the State Department of Education, who gave an address on the subject of "Thorough & Efficient". After the address, many questions relative to the implementation of state funding of local public school education were raised by the audience and answered by Dr. Brooks.

The meeting was then reconvened at 10:10 p.m. by the Chairman for the further Hearing of Citizens.

Several parents from the Spring Garden School Area questioned the Board relative to a rumored "multi-age grouping" with the elimination of one teacher at Yantacaw School.

Mr. Fowler confirmed the fact that it was the Board's intention to cut back by one teacher due to decreased enrollment, but pointed out that multi-age grouping was only one of the possible solutions, and no decision had been reached. These parents stated their opposition to economizing by the removal of one teacher if it meant a change in the presently existing program.

The question was also raised as to the value of the Jersey City State College program of placing teacher trainees in Yantacaw School. Mr. Fowler replied that the administration's assessment of the program indicated that it was good for both students and teachers.
