Board of Education Nutley, New Jersey

The Regular Meeting of the Board of Education of the Town of Nutley, New Jersey, was held in the Board of Education Office, 149 Chestnut Street, on Monday, December 22, 1975, at 8:00 p.m., with Mrs. Thomas E. Jaworek, President, presiding.

#### FLAG SALUTE:

The meeting was opened with Mr. Perez leading the Board members and citizens in the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag.

#### ROLL CALL:

The other members present at roll call were: Mr. John E. Clayton, Jr., Mr. Walter S. Lindstrom, Mr. Carl Perez, Mrs. Edward M. Popadick, Mrs. Bernard Rabinowitz, Mr. Gerard T. Restaino, Mr. Frank V. Tangorra and Mr. Louis F. Williams. Four citizens were present.

#### MINUT ES:

Copies of the minutes of the Regular Board Meeting held on November 24, 1975, at 8:00 p.m., being in the hands of each member, reading of same was dispensed. Mr. Tangorra moved that the minutes be approved, seconded by Mrs. Popadick, and unanimously approved by the Board.

# COMMUNICATIONS:

Mr. Ramsland presented the following communications:

1.

A letter from Dr. Milton J. Lerner, Kearny, New Jersey:

"I am writing in regards to the following situation:

"On Tuesday, November 25, 1975, I purchased 4 adult and 2 student tickets to the Kearny-Nutley football game to be played Thursday, November 27, 1975 at 10:30 A.M. This game was cancelled by your school, and as I had other plans for the rest of the holiday weekend I could not use these tickets.

"On my return to Kearny Thursday, December 1st, I contacted the Kearny Board of Education, and was informed to bring the tickets to the High School office where they were purchased. I did this on Wednesday December 3rd at 8:30 and was informed that they had already sent the monies to your school system.

"I called Nutley at 8:45 and spoke to Mr. Gallucci who informed me that all the money had been divided up and he felt that, 'It's too late and too much trouble', but he would speak to the Board Secretary and he would return my call. This he did, and left a message that the Board Secretary also said 'Too late, no refunds'.

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"My point is, \$6.00 is less than 5 minutes work to me, but to a lot of students who bought tickets and couldn't use them on the new date because they had to work, \$4.00 or even \$2.00 is a lot of money, and your educational system certainly made no honest attempt to refund monies for unused tickets to anyone for this cancelled game. Your offices were closed Thursday, November 27th, Friday, November 28th, Saturday, November 29th and Sunday, November 30th, and then to tell me on Wednesday, December 3rd at 8:45 A. M. that because all the figuring was done and a split was made, that 'It's too late and too much trouble to give refunds' - 'That's a rip off'.

"I am certain that Mr. Fred Burk of the State Education Commission, and Mrs. Virginia Long of the State Consumers Affairs Office will agree that your school system has to make a diligent effort to refund monies to all persons with unused tickets to this cancelled game - not withstanding the fact that it was played at a later date.

"Please inform me of the Board's action in this matter."

# SECRETARY'S REPORT:

Mr. Ramsland presented and read the following report:

"We are approaching budget deadline dates for yet another year with but two relatively minor items yet unresolved -- teachers salaries and state aid. If it seems to you that you've heard this song before, you have, and you'll probably hear it again.

"In the state aid chess game, it seems to be the Supreme Court's move. It would seem, however, that this body is striving to outdo the Legislature in the amount of time to plan and execute a move.

"Meanwhile, back at the ranch, our citizens are once again responding in admirable fashion to our appeal to them to staff the polls at the forthcoming school election. As of this date, we are adequately staffed, although an additional person or two in a couple of districts would make the work lighter. We always have to anticipate some cancellations because of sickness or other emergency.

"A committee of the Board met with the representatives of the Radcliffe School P. T.A. on December 10 at 7:30 p.m. Their concerns about the play facilities at the school were thoroughly and intelligently aired and considered. The Board and the representatives both accepted assignments for further research and another meeting will be held as soon as time permits.

"The new hall lockers are now being installed on the second floor of Franklin School. These were delayed last summer, and arrived just a week before school opened in September -- too late to complete installation in time.

"The bleachers at the Park Oval have been taken down and stored. A large number of seat and foot boards will need to be replaced before they are again erected next spring.

"The usual report on maintenance projects will be deferred until next month.

"I take this opportunity to wish for all of you a very Merry Christmas and a most blessed, prosperous and happy New Year. May God's richest blessings attend your way as you walk in His Counsel. "Fire drills were held at the various schools during the months of November and December:

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#### FINANCIAL REPORT:

Mr. Ramsland presented the financial report as of November 30, 1975, showing total funds available of \$8,878,072.74, contractual orders to date of \$7,728,513.54, leaving a balance of funds available of \$1,149,559.20.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT:

Mr. Fowler presented and read the following report:

"Nutley's Title II application (School Library Resources) has been forwarded to the New Jersey State Department of Education. Our total allocation is \$4,079.00, or seventy-five cents per student. This year's allocation is based upon an inventory of the sound film strip collection in each school. Seventy-five cents per student is the maximum allocation allowed to any district.

"A three year comparative study of reading achievement for seventh grade students who started their education in Nutley and students who moved into the district at the third grade level indicates the following:

"On December 8, 1975 a continuing in-service reading program was initiated for the Franklin School staff. Mrs. Lucy Gillies, in cooperation with the staff, prepared the materials that were used.

"Musical groups from Franklin School and the high school entertained during Nutley's annual Christmas tree lighting ceremony on December 15, 1975.

"Mr. Daniel Marese, a local resident and an employee of Essex Chemical Company, planned a Christmas party for the children in the special education program. This party was held in the gymnasium of Lincoln School on December 16, 1975.

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"This past week Nutley's senior citizens participated in a program at Lincoln School which prepared them for a safe drivers examination. Those who successfully complete the examination will be awarded a reduced insurance rate, pending approval of the insurance carrier.

"The program at the Special Education Center has received some contract work from the Mac Wayne Plastics Company, Route 23, Wayne, New Jersey. In addition, Hoffmann-LaRoche has assigned a new contract to be completed by the students.

"Dr. Thomas Davis, Assistant Superintendent of Schools, and Mr. Joseph Affinito, Media Specialist, are planning a video tape recording workshop for twelve staff members beginning January 14, 1976 and continuing through February 4, 1976.

"The Nutley High School guidance counselors have received the results of the Differential Aptitude Tests. At the present time the counselors are meeting with parents and students to interpret the test results.

"The Resource Centers in all elementary schools and Franklin School are functioning very well. Each center is staffed through Elementary and Secondary Education Act, Title I funds. In addition, some students are being serviced through N.J.S.A. 18A:46, or commonly called the Beadleston Act.

#### CAFETERIA REPORT:

Mr. Tangorra presented the cafeteria report as of November 30, 1975, showing a cash balance as of July 1, 1975 of \$794.90, total receipts of \$57,396.66, total disbursements of \$52,387.25, leaving a balance of \$5,804.31. Total "A" lunch - 15,589. Total milk sold - 15,055. Free lunches - 2,410. Reduced price lunches - 488. Senior Citizen lunches - 127. School days - 15.
