March 3, 1981

The Regular Meeting of the Board of Education of the Town of Nutley, New Jersey, was held in the Nutley High School Auditorium, 300 Franklin Avenue, on Tuesday, March 3, 1981, at 8:00 p.m., with Mr. Louis F. Williams, President, presiding.

FLAG SALUTE:

The meeting was opened with Mr. Murray leading the Board members and citizens in the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF ADEQUATE NOTICE:

Mr. Williams read the following notice:

"As required by the 'Open Public Meetings Act' (Chapter 231, P.L. 1975), notice of this meeting was provided to the public and the press at least 48 hours in advance by:

- "1. Posting at the entrance of the Board offices.
- "2. Mailing or delivering to The Nutley Sun, the Newark-Star Ledger, and the Passaic Herald-News, and
- "3. Delivering to the Nutley Town Clerk."

CALL OF ROLL:

The other members present at roll call were: Mrs. Jacqueline Imhoff, Mr. James Murray, Mr. Carl Perez, Mrs. Ann Rabinowitz, Mr. Gerard T. Restaino, and Mrs. Marilyn Wightman. Absent and excused: Mr. Douglas Eisenfelder and Mr. Frank V. Tangorra. Twenty three citizens were present.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Copies of the minutes of the Regular Meeting held on January 26, 1981, at 8:55 p.m., being in the hands of each member, reading of same was dispensed. Mr. Perez moved that the minutes be approved, seconded by Mr. Murray, and unanimously approved by the Board.

COMMUNICATIONS:

Mr. Ramsland presented and read the following communications:

1. A letter from Diane P. Hall:

"I wish to express my feelings about Bethel Assembly of God Crisis Center to all of you. I am a psychiatric nurse

as well as a Nutley resident and mother of two children who attend Nutley High School. Because of all I have read in the Nutley Sun and also because one of my own clients at the agency where I am employed entered the program, I decided to see first hand what was going on and visited the 29 New Street residence.

"Mrs. Yolanda Cleffi spoke with me concerning the program, introduced me to the young women housed there at this time, and showed me the entire house. The schedule of daily activities began at 7:30 a.m. and ended at 10:00 p.m. and included considerable time for prayer and study. The young women are always closely supervised. They were quiet and respectful to Mrs. Cleffi and myself. The house was clean, well maintained and comfortably, but simply, furnished.

"Although I have some reservations about the restrictive treatment in this spiritually based program, I have none whatsoever regarding the influence it might have on the community. I fail to see how these few, well supervised young women could adversely affect my teenage children in the high school across the street, especially since both of them have been offered drugs right in the school building. If anything, I believe my children are impressed to know that someone in their own community cares enough to provide help for those already plagued by substance abuse.

"I urge you to visit Bethel Crisis Center before continuing to influence more residents against it. Thank you for your time and consideration."

2. A letter from Senator John H. Ewing, 16th District:

"I agree that the present State Administration is way off base in eliminating the amount of State Aid for Education which they are doing for the 81-82 school year.

"I have legislation in now which would prohibit the elimination of State Aid and I will also put in my own resolution or co-sponsor one with Senator Feldman for the Joint Appropriations Committee in order to restore this aid.

"However, I do not feel that legislation itself can get the job accomplished unless the citizens write personally to the Governor urging re-instatement of the proposed cuts.

"I strongly urge that you have your elected officials and the parents of your students as individuals write to the Governor urging re-instatement of the cuts.

"I would not, repeat would not have resolutions saying that 'a certain number of people' or 'the citizens of your municipality' are against the cuts - it must be a massive mail protest of individual letters."

3. A joint letter from Assemblyman Dean A. Gallo and Assemblywoman Leanna Brown, 24th District, to Louis F. Williams, President:

"Thank you for your recent correspondence concerning the Governor's proposed elimination of aid to minimum aid school districts.

"Enclosed is a copy of our joint press release concerning this matter. We are strongly opposed to the proposed cuts, and we feel that in doing this, the Governor would be going back on his commitment to education in New Jersey. Please be assured we will do all that we can to see that this commitment is honored.

"We appreciated receiving your comments, and please feel free to let us know if we can ever be of service to you in the future."

SECRETARY'S REPORT:

Mr. Ramsland presented and read the following report:

1. "The date for filing nominating petitions for the Board member election has passed, and the drawing for position on the ballot was conducted last Friday night. Ann Rabinowitz, Louis F. Williams, and Carl Perez will appear on the ballot in that order. No other petitions were filed to challenge the three incumbents.
2. "The water from our well in the Park Oval has been tested for potability and found to be of excellent quality. Commissioner Lucy's department has installed a pipe from the well to two spigots at the Vincent Place curb where Nutley residents may come to draw clean drinking water.
3. "Under the provisions of Ch. 86, P.L. 1980, the Social Security referendum was held in all the Essex County School Districts on January 31, 1981. The following results have been certified:

Eligible Voters	3879
"Yes" Votes	2322
"No" Votes	1080

"Approval of a minimum of 25% of eligible voters was necessary for a successful referendum and division. The above figures represent 60% of those eligible voters who voted 'yes' for coverage under Social Security and transfer to the Public Employees Retirement System. Those who voted 'no', or who did not vote at all, may remain in the Essex County Board of Education Employees Retirement System, and thus avoid Social Security deductions and coverage.

4. "A two day workshop on Program Oriented Budgeting (P.O.B.) will be conducted for all Business Administrators and Superintendents in Essex County on March 23 and 24 in Livingston.

The workshop will explore the concept of P.O.B., and will include explanations of recoding, recasting and budget development.

5. "Family income guidelines for determining eligibility for free and reduced price lunches have been changed and will become effective as of March 16. In general, children in a family of four or less whose total income is under \$10,250 will not be affected. However, for families of any size with incomes above that number, the income level, instead of being increased to allow for inflation, has been reduced, thereby making children who are now receiving free lunches ineligible after March 16. Mrs. Simons has completed a re-evaluation of all the applications, and determined that 38 children will be affected by this change.

FINANCIAL REPORT:

Mr. Ramsland presented the financial report as of January 31, 1981, showing total funds available of \$12,579,329.13, contractual orders to date of \$11,585,608.41, leaving a balance of funds available of \$993,720.72.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT:

Dr. Fadule presented and read the following report:

"As required by New Jersey T & E law, I would like to direct your attention to the Annual Improvement Program budget which our Board will be adopting tonight along with other sections of the school budget. For the 1981/1982 school year we will commit \$76,904.00 in teachers salaries to remedial programs being run in the Franklin School and the high school. State Compensatory Education money in the amount of \$84,837.00 will be expended in this budget. Of that figure \$72,000.00 will be spent on teachers salaries; \$8,049.00 on supplies and \$4,788.00 on Social Security.

"Our Title I program budget for the year is \$80,000.00 and that amount is being spent as follows: \$67,200.00 for salaries for

teachers during the regular school year; \$4,500.00 for secretarial help. Supplies for the Title I budget will cost \$2,630.00, equipment will cost \$1,200.00 and Social Security payments to cover employees' salaries will cost \$4,470.00. To summarize the costs of the annual improvement program, local taxpayers will pay \$76,904.00 for teachers' salaries in the unit programs, the state will contribute \$84,837.00 for State Compensatory Education programs, and we will receive \$80,000.00 in federal money for E.S.E.A. Title I remedial programs. The total amount of money from all sources to be expended on remedial programs in 1981/1982 will be \$241,741.00.

"Attached to the budget cover sheet are two additional sheets in the improvement budget schedule, pages which describe the line item account numbers for the manpower, supplies and equipment which we plan to purchase. A final page of the program improvement budget indicates the methods we will use in evaluating teaching and measuring the progress of students who participate in these programs.

"Mr. President, citizens and professional staff members may discuss any of these topics at a point in this meeting which you find appropriate. All documents pertaining to this budget are available for inspection at this meeting and are also available at the school board offices on Chestnut Street."

CAFETERIA REPORT:

Mrs. Rabinowitz presented the cafeteria report as of January 31, 1981, showing a cash balance as of July 1, 1980 of \$21.34, total receipts of \$141,978.92, total disbursements of \$127,731.21, leaving a balance of \$14,269.05. Total "A" lunch - 22,154. Total milk sold - 20,698. Free lunches - 3,774. Reduced price lunches - 1,232. School days - 19.

Mr. Williams presented the proposed 1981-1982 budget and made several preliminary comments, followed by a short explanation of each account in the budget book. He then opened the meeting for questions from the floor.
