August 24, 1981

The Regular Meeting of the Board of Education of the Town of Nutley, New Jersey, was held in the Board Room, 149 Chestnut Street, on Monday, August 24, 1981, at 8:00 p.m., with Mrs. Ann Rabinowitz, President, presiding.

FLAG SALUTE:

The meeting was opened with Mr. Tangorra leading the Board members and citizens in the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag.

CALL OF ROLL:

The other members present at roll call were: Mr. Douglas Eisenfelder, Mr. James Murray, Mr. Carl Perez, Mr. Gerard T. Restaino, Mr. Frank V. Tangorra, and Mr. Louis F. Williams. Absent and excused: Mrs. Jacqueline Imhoff. Sixty five citizens were present.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Copies of the minutes of the Regular Meeting held on July 27, 1981, at 8:30 p.m., being in the hands of each member, reading of same was dispensed. Mr. Perez moved that the minutes be approved, seconded by Mr. Murray, and unanimously approved by the Board.

COMMUNICATIONS:

None

SECRETARY'S REPORT:

Mr. Ramsland presented and read the following report:

"Summer maintenance work has been proceeding quite well. The schedule had to be revised to remedy a major heating problem at the high school which was not evident at budget time. Also, the fixtures needed for the electrical work (emergency, gym, and stairwell lighting) at the 5 elementary schools were quite late in arriving. This upset not only the contractor's schedule, but also that of our custodians for refinishing of gym floors.

"Some of the work is quite visible and some will never be seen. Among the more visible jobs was the painting of the Park Oval fence. It also took longer than anticipated, because considerably more scraping

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and spot-priming was necessary than was originally thought to be necessary. Among the jobs which will never see the light of day was the replacement of condensate return lines from the heating units in five rooms in the math wing of the high school. These lines ran along the outside walls buried under all the univents and cabinets. All this cabinet work had to be removed, pipes dug up and replaced, floor patched, and cabinets re-assembled and put in place.

"As for roof work, Washington School roof, except for a small section done about 5 years ago, was done in its entirety by an outside contractor. Our own maintenance men did a section of the warehouse roof in addition to 8 other items of carpentry and general repairs and replacement of 24 windows.

"I have received notice from Joel Jacobson, Commissioner of the New Jersey State Department of Energy that they have recommended five of our schools for Federal funding of Technical Assistance Audits. The total amount tentatively approved is \$53,947, half of which would be Federally funded. I will have more detail regarding this matter if and when the U.S. Department of Energy approves the State's recommendation."

#### FINANCIAL REPORT:

Mr. Ramsland presented the financial report as of June 30, 1981, showing total funds available of \$12,679,163.85, contractual orders to date of \$11,661,972.56, leaving a balance of funds available of \$1,017,191.29.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT:

Dr. Fadule presented and read the following report:

"While most of the summer was spent dealing with personnel matters, other normal activities such as summer school and the enrichment program were conducted in a successful manner. The number of students in these programs is as follows:

"Other activities pertaining to curriculum matters such as the K-4 gifted program were also undertaken. In summary, we feel quite confident that we are well prepared for the academic year."

#### CAFETERIA REPORT:

Mr. Eisenfelder presented the cafeteria report as of June 30, 1981, showing a cash balance as of July 1, 1980 of \$21.34, total receipts of \$291,667.61, total disbursements of \$280,014.07, leaving a balance of \$11,674.88. Total "A" lunch - 14,544. Total milk sold - 15,151.

#### HEARING OF CITIZENS (Agenda Items Only):

Mr. Donald Heerwig, 148 Lakeside Drive, commented that he noticed the resignation of Dr. Patrick Antonelli as Director of Guidance at Nutley High School, to which Mrs. Rabinowitz replied that he had accepted the position of Director of Special Services in Hillside.

Mrs. Rabinowitz then stated that she would at that time permit the citizens of Nutley to speak on any item rather than agenda items only.

Mr. Lenny Larcara, 436 Walnut Street, read the following prepared statement:

"Members of the School Board know me as Len Larcara, but I am speaking tonight as president of S.O.N. - SAVE OUR NEIGHBORHOOD.

"We of S.O.N. are strongly protesting the plan to build 23 multi-family dwellings in the midst of our one-family, residential neighborhood, which is designated R1 by the Nutley Zoning Code.

"The Town of Nutley, Department of Public Works, in a letter dated August 4th, denied a building construction permit for the Jack Green Homes, Inc. and Pat Intindola, Chief Administrator of the Code Enforcement Department lists 12 violations to the Zoning Code.

"I will now give you these violations in layman's terms.

1. The Code permits a maximum density of (8) families per acre - Green's plans show 23 dwellings on 1.39 acres.
2. The Code prohibits multi-family dwellings in a residential one-family district.
3. The Code requires front yard set-backs of 35 ft. - Green's plans show 25 ft.

4. The Code requires that all buildings to front a street or court must be not less than twice the average height of the building. The building that would back up to my property would not pass the Code, and should not even be there.
5. The rear yards of buildings are smaller than the code requires.
6. The side yards of buildings are smaller than the Code requires.
7. The Code states that no building running approximately parallel to a street shall exceed 100 ft. in length, and the buildings that would face Howe Ave. exceed this dimension.
8. The Green plan shows parking in front yards and the Code prohibits parking in front yards.
9. The Code specifies that lot coverage of a garden apartment group is not to exceed 25% of the land area. The Green plan exceeds 25%.
10. The Code limits driveways to 16 ft. and the plan shows approximately 22 ft.
11. The Code limits the curb cuts to 16 ft. and the plan shows approximately 22 ft.
12. The Code requires a loading space and the plan does not show a loading space.

"We urge all residents throughout the Town of Nutley to demand that our Zoning Code not be violated with regard to all development in R1, one-family, residential areas. Let us hear everyone say, 'YES' to upholding Nutley's Zoning Code - for it is this Code which protects our residential neighborhoods and controls the destiny of the Town of Nutley. We want Nutley to remain an attractive, family-oriented, suburban town."

Mrs. Audrey S. Betts, 22 Howe Avenue, read the following statement:

"I wish to inform the Board of Education that I am totally opposed to the sale of the Special Education Center Tract to Jack Green Homes for the proposed construction of multi-family dwellings. Among the multiple problems that multiple dwellings will obviously bring to a single family residential zone is one of traffic.

"On just one block of Howe Avenue the existing volume of cars moving in and out of driveways will increase from 7 at the present time to a possible 29 with the proposed construction. Where there are now 4 driveways, the builder plans to skyrocket that number to 15 driveways. This, coupled with increased street traffic, will present an ever-escalating safety hazard.

"Since the property in question is zoned for single family dwellings, I submit that it is in the best interest of all residents concerned to keep it that way. Save Our Neighborhood and our town from erosion of single family zoning by multi-family dwellings."

Mr. John Kerin, 45 Oak Street, read the following statement:

"We know the School Board wants to sell the former Sons of Italy Orphanage site located at 533 Washington Avenue. And, we want to know WHY the School Board did not sell the site to the highest bidder - with no strings or conditions attached to the sale?

"By accepting the highest bid based on the conditions that the developer can get the necessary zoning variances, it would appear the School Board has become party to a plan to flaunt our Nutley zoning code, and thereby change the character and quality of life of those nearby residents who live in one-family homes, as specified by the R1, residential, one-family designation of the code.

"Perhaps it is time for the School Board to have a lesson in what zoning is all about:

"Zoning provides a comprehensive plan for the maintenance, protection, and upgrading of the community. It is an appropriate extension of the community's authority to pass laws related to protecting public health, safety, morals, and general welfare.

"Zoning must reflect and help to maintain a working balance between the number of people living in an area and the capacity of the town to furnish needed public services.

"Zoning seeks to promote design flexibility, to encourage more open spaces, and to foster development that is generally compatible with the character of the surrounding community.

"Zoning controls population density so that development CAN NOT outstrip the town's ability to provide services, such as fire protection, school facilities, garbage collection, and hospital services.

"Zoning ensures the provision of light and air.

"Zoning ensures the provision of adequate open space in residential neighborhoods.

"Zoning controls the physical volume of a building.

"Zoning helps to eliminate traffic congestion and air pollution.

"Zoning affects property values: it ensures that individual owners do not reap windfall profits or cause injury to surrounding owners.

"Zoning designs a town - it provides both building occupants and the general public with space, light, air and ventilation, and a safer and more livable environment.

"Zoning protects the scale and quality of our neighborhood. Zoning controls the destiny of our neighborhood and our town.

"We are astonished and dismayed at our School Board for not learning what zoning is all about - before conditionally accepting the Jack Green Homes, Inc. bid.

"We are astonished that the School Board, representing a branch of our town government has turned against the residents of the north east residential section of Nutley in favor of an out-of-town developer.

"Furthermore, we demand that the School Board protect and uphold the Nutley zoning code and the residents of Nutley - by withdrawing as sponsor to the twenty three multi-family dwelling development, and by withdrawing the bid of Jack Green Homes, Inc."

Mr. Skip Arculli, 14 Howe Avenue, read the following statement:

"We, the residents of the north-east section of Nutley are shocked to find the quality of life in our one-family residential neighborhood is being put in jeopardy by our own local School Board by its tentative acceptance of a bid from a developer who proposes a multi-family dwelling development.

"We oppose any multi-family dwellings on this site, which is in a one-family residential area. Thus, it is more than obvious, that when the zoning code permits a maximum of eight families per acre, we would certainly oppose the development plan to erect 23 dwellings with parking provided for 54 cars on a 1.3 acre site.

"We residents find ourselves in a very unusual situation. We must not only fight to defeat a developer's plans, we must also fight to persuade the owner of the property, the Nutley School Board, to reject the bid of the developer.

"We question WHY the School Board did not set a minimum bidding price to cover the School Board's purchase price of \$175,000.00, and make the sale conditional to the building of one-family houses?

"We demand to know what is the reason why our School Board is supporting the Jack Green Homes, Inc. proposal when the School Board should be aware that this action will result in the over-crowding and the spoiling of a nice neighborhood of one-family homes.

"Perhaps the School Board will say that the Jack Green Homes plan will bring increased tax revenue to the town. But will the building of the development decrease our taxes? - 'With the

current inflation - NO!! Will the building of the development decrease the value of our homes? - YES! Will the addition of 54 cars from the development create a threat to our children? - YES! Will the addition of 46 to 93 or more people in the development overcrowd block 522 and the surrounding area? - YES!

"It would seem that the School Board is willing to accept the Green proposal strictly for the monetary gain to the Board. Thus, it would also appear that the School Board is in the business of real estate speculation.

"It is we, the residents of Nutley, who have elected you to the School Board, and we elected you for the purpose of seeing that our children are educated, but we have not elected you to see you destroy the quality of life in our one-family residential neighborhood. Therefore, we respectfully petition the School Board to reject the bid and the development plans of Jack Green Homes, Inc."

Mr. Ray Peccatiello, 136 Rutgers Place, informed the Board the committee had hired an attorney, James Piro, and if necessary they would take the issue through the court system. Mrs. Marlene Cocchiola, 100 North Road, and Mr. J. DeLaRosa, 50 Howe Avenue, spoke on the same subject.

Mrs. Rabinowitz responded that the Board had decided that the property in question was no longer needed for educational purposes. The Board, therefore, decided to sell it to the highest bidder, returning it to a taxable status, which would be in the best interests of the taxpayers of Nutley. She continued by stating that to ask that the offer to sell the property now be rescinded was not legally possible and that the only way the contract with Jack Green Homes, Inc. could be voided unilaterally would be if the variance were to be denied by the appropriate governing body of the Town of Nutley.

Mr. Restaino stated that he did not feel that it was appropriate at this particular time for the Board to further discuss the matter of the proposed property sale.

#### BILLS AND MANDATORY PAYMENTS:

Mr. Eisenfelder presented and moved the adoption of the following resolution, seconded by Mr. Tangorra. On a roll call vote the resolution was unanimously adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Education authorizes the payment of bills and mandatory payments in the total amount of \$349,548.84 as per the attached Schedule A which have been audited by the Business Department.

REQUESTS FOR USE OF SCHOOL BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS:

Mr. Eisenfelder presented and moved the adoption of the following resolution, seconded by Mr. Perez, and unanimously approved by the Board:

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Education approves the requests for the use of school buildings and grounds (Schedule B), provided they conform to the rules and regulations set by the Board of Education.

REAPPOINTMENT - Teacher:Mrs. Edith Weedo

Mr. Tangorra presented and moved the adoption of the following resolution, seconded by Mr. Perez. On a roll call vote the resolution was unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, Mrs. Edith Weedo's position as a business education teacher at Nutley High School was eliminated as a result of a reduction in force on April 27, 1981, and



WHEREAS, the Nutley Board of Education has determined that additional business education classes should be offered, and

WHEREAS, Mrs. Edith Weedo is the most senior teaching staff member qualified to teach said business education classes,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Nutley Board of Education shall offer her employment as a business education teacher and shall place her at the appropriate step of the salary guide and she shall receive all emoluments as set forth in the 1981/1982 collective negotiations agreement entered into by the Nutley Board of Education and the Education Association of Nutley. (\$14,016.00, B.A. - 4)
