Board of Education Nutley, New Jersey May 24, 1982

The Regular Meeting of the Board of Education of the Township of Nutley, New Jersey, was held in the Nutley High School Auditorium, 300 Franklin Avenue, on Monday, May 24, 1982, at 8:00 p.m., with Mrs. Ann Rabinowitz, presiding.

FLAG SALUTE:

The meeting was opened with Mr. Kucinski leading the Board members and citizens in the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag.

CALL OF ROLL:

The other members present at roll call were: Dr. Anthony N. Baratta, Mr. Douglas Eisenfelder, Mr. Charles W. Kucinski, Jr., Mr. Joseph Malanga, Mr. Carl Perez, Mr. Frank V. Tangorra, and Mr. Louis F. Williams. Absent and excused: Mrs. Jacqueline Imhoff. Approximately 200 citizens were present.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Copies of the minutes of the Special Meeting held on April 26, 1982 at 7:30 p.m., being in the hands of each member, reading of same was dispensed. Mr. Eisenfelder moved that the minutes be approved, seconded by Mr. Williams, and unanimously approved by the Board.

Copies of the minutes of the Regular Meeting held on April 26, 1982 at 8:25 p.m., being in the hands of each member, reading of same was dispensed. Mr. Eisenfelder moved that the minutes be approved, seconded by Mr. Williams, and unanimously approved by the Board.

COMMUNICATIONS:

Mr. Ramsland presented and read the following communications:

1. A letter from Norma Prochaska:

"Thank you for your letters of April 27 and of April 30 thanking me for assisting at the school election polls in April.

"The duty is a pleasant service, however, there exists a situation which I do feel could be made more convenient for the voters.

"Apparently, for school board elections some areas are required to vote at a different location than their normal voting place.

"Couldn't there be a better way to inform those persons of this difference?

"Granted, this has probably been the situation for some time, however, there are a great many persons who were either unaware, not informed or had forgotten. On both April 6 and April 20 there were many persons who had gone to their 'regular' voting place only to be redirected from there to their 'correct' school board election place. Some may be new voters, some infrequent voters and some new to the neighborhood, whatever, they wanted to vote! It would be unfortunate to discourage them.

"For those districts which have a 'different' polling place for school board elections couldn't the citizens of those addresses be specifically informed? It could be done with minimum expense with a circular carried home by school children for distribution to immediate neighbors.

"I'm told this announcement is made through the Nutley Sun and Channel T. It appears to be insufficient. My home does not have Channel T and we infrequently purchase the Nutley Sun. This may be so in other homes, too.

"Please understand, I am not in a district which has two voting places but I did feel sorry for those who were trying to find out where to vote.

"Another helpful identification would be to label the tables prominately at which the books of the districts are located. This simple gesture would save both the voters and clerks some time.

"Thank you for your consideration of these suggestions."

SECRETARY'S REPORT:

Mr. Ramsland presented and read the following report:

"Aside from the items for discussion on tonight's agenda, very little is available for a formal report at this date.

"Mr. Gino Giua is on vacation; therefore, I do not have the usual summary of window replacements and maintenance items.

"It may be of interest to note that increases in bid prices are lower this year than they have been the last few years. For example, for the three bid awards on tonight's agenda (items 24, 25 and 26) which recur every year, commercial printing shows an increase of 6.2% over last year's, ice cream is 5.8% above last years bid, and milk is 8.5% over that of 1981-1982.

"This moderation is, however, by no means universal. I received notice last week that the monthly rates in the municipal parking lot in which we park ten of our vehicles is being increased June 1st from \$7.50 to \$12.00. A little basic skills arithmetic shows this to be a 60% increase.

Mr. Duffy also questioned whether a football coach was worth \$30,000 a year, and why he would only be teaching three classes, to which Dr. Fadule gave a detailed explanation.

Jean Donadia, 224 Grant Avenue, Carmen Lemma and Ethan Addes spoke with regard to the salary and teaching classes of the football coach. Jack Speary, 6 Oakridge Avenue, complimented the Board on securing an experienced coach, and stated that he personally was thankful that they had selected such a fine individual.
