The Regular Meeting of the Board of Education of the Township of Nutley, New Jersey was held in the Radcliffe School Multi-Purpose Room, 379 Bloomfield Avenue, on Monday, November 22, 1999 at 8:07 p.m. with Mr. Vincent A. Moscaritola, President, presiding.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF MEETING:

Mr. Moscaritola read the following:

HEARING OF CITIZENS:

Mrs. Gail Kline, 28 North Spring Garden Avenue, read the following statement:

"At the September 27, 1999 Board of Ed meeting, in response to Debra Falanga's expression of concern regarding the grading system, Mr. Moscaritola replied, 'that this issue has already been addressed, noting that not many people have appeared at Board meetings expressing concern.'

"Mr. Moscaritola, since you were not a board member and rarely attended board meetings when interest in the grading issue was rekindled in 1994 and 1995, you may not be aware that board meetings were often packed with standing room only in support of a change to the grading system. It was precisely this reason that the infamous November 25, 1995 meeting took place, right here in Radcliffe School. I remember it well. In fact, you were one of the 33 people who spoke that night.

"After that meeting, many people were disgusted and gave up hope of any change.

"Since then, however, over 25 people have appeared at board meetings and asked to have the grading system changed.

"Letters have been written to local papers and more than 60 articles regarding the Nutley grading system have appeared in The Nutley Sun, The Nutley Journal and the Star Ledger.

"In fact, in the April 8, 1999 edition of The Nutley Sun there appeared an article entitled, 'Women voters announce the annual forum featuring the Board of Education candidates.' Joanna Conrad, the voter service coordinator for the Nutley league was quoted as saying, 'in year's past the league avoided the subject of implementing a new grading system, knowing full well that at least one member of the public would ask such a question. But this year, she said, the league felt a responsibility to address the subject...it's such a hot issue, we felt we couldn't avoid it.'

So, to say that 'not many people have appeared at board meetings expressing concern' which implies a general public disinterest in changing the grading system is inaccurate."

<u>Commissioner Peter Scarpelli</u> indicated that he was appearing as a grandparent of eight grandchildren to express his concern with the backpacks the students have to carry for their books, noting that the weight is excessive. He noted that this should be looked into by the administration, stating that perhaps homework could be coordinated among the teachers.

Dr. Serafino replied that she would like to set up a meeting with Commissioner Scarpelli and Dr. Vivinetto, Franklin School principal. She added that she wished Commissioner Scarpelli had come to her with his concern as it would have been addressed. Dr. Serafino stated that some school districts have purchased double sets of books for their students but we could not afford that expense.

Mr. Picciano expressed his agreement with Commissioner Scarpelli, noting that this is a district-wide issue and the cost for a second set of books should be determined.

Mrs. Fran Umstadter, 150 Crestwood Avenue, asked if a survey had ever been sent to parents regarding the grading system. Dr. Serafino replied that this would not be considered at this point since change has been made and it is necessary to see how effective it is. She noted that the district has already gone through a committee process.

Mrs. Laurie Wheatman, 28 Stanley Avenue, asked if the issue of moving sixth graders to Franklin School would be discussed. She also asked if the architect's report had been received. Dr. Serafino responded that a meeting with the architect would take place on November 30 and this matter would possibly be discussed at the Board meeting which will be held on December 20.

Mrs. Debra Falanga, 48 North Spring Garden Avenue, thanked Dr. Serafino for attending the PTO meeting at Spring Garden School and alerting the parents of the possible move of sixth graders to Franklin School. She asked if the architect's report would be made public and, if so, when. Mr. Sincaglia explained that the architect's report was the feasibility study and the Board was asked to consider two possible scenarios - moving grade 6 to Franklin School or keeping the grade configuration as it was.

Mr. Sincaglia further indicated that this is a draft report but at some point in the not-too-distant future the Board will make a decision about the direction it will go and at that point the architect will further revise things. He also noted that the architect will design things the way we say we want pursuant to program structure. He further stated that after a Board decision a plan will be submitted to the state and a referendum will be submitted to the voters.

Mrs. Falanga noted that Dr. Serafino had said that even if the sixth grade gets moved almost all of the other schools will need renovation anyway. Mr. Sincaglia indicated that there are a number of similarities and the architect has been asked to look at certain things. He also commented that Nutley has not had a significant referendum in 31 years and it is a question of what is appropriate at each building. Mr. Sincaglia also stated that at some

point the Board will have to address what is appropriate and necessary and what it is thought the voters in Nutley will support, adding that we will likely not receive any help from the state. He added that it is part of the process and the public will have a great deal of input. He also added that a case can be made for doing something at every building - it is a question of how much you want to spend.

Mrs. Falanga indicated that the concern of parents is that the decision will be made without parental input and she wants the Board to hear the parents before a decision is made. Mr. Sincaglia noted that the Superintendent went to every elementary school to see how parents felt. Dr. Serafino stated that she has not yet been to the middle school and has not yet met with the fifth and sixth grade teachers.

Mrs. Falanga commented that her biggest concern is the safety issue. Dr. Serafino remarked that if more input is needed it will be solicited. Mr. Moscaritola explained that Mrs. Falanga's concerns should be related to the PTO president or the Board representative to the school. He further stated that everything will be taken into consideration, adding that nothing has been decided yet regarding class configuration.

Mrs. Russo commented that she has stated from the beginning that we need participation from the community. She noted that the Board had taken a look at facilities through the Facilities Committee and has reached the point of a feasibility study. Mrs. Russo explained that the Board will study this to determine educational benefits, safety and enhancements for all of the schools.

Mrs. Russo also noted that she has encouraged the public to attend conference meetings where they can sit and listen and where a great deal of information is disseminated. She also stated that she has asked repeatedly for a paper which will give updates on Board activities to the community. Mrs. Russo indicated that the Board has a responsibility to encourage people to read a paper and to come to meetings.

Mrs. Russo assured the public that the Board is not making decisions lightly; in fact, we are making decisions quite slowly. She noted that, initially, the projected date for the referendum was this December but she doesn't feel it will happen this year. She explained that the December date was selected so that construction could begin in the summer. Mrs. Russo reiterated that communication should be encouraged and must be done effectively.

Mr. Picciano commented that it is a public school system which means our concern is not merely parents but town wide and he would like the Board to have an open town meeting so people can come and the Board can receive their input. Mr. Picciano then quoted a line from a letter Charlie Tedesco had sent to a local newspaper: "Parents and taxpayers should be addressed as a whole at a town meeting we are all invited to attend."

Mr. Picciano noted that he has gone through seven referendums where he works and everyone was brought together. He mentioned the need to establish rapport in a community to get your point across, adding that more people must be empowered. Mr. Picciano added that the key words are "public school system" and people must be involved in this decision.

- Dr. Serafino stated that a meeting with the architect is scheduled for November 30 with Board members and administrators. She noted that the purpose of the meeting is to decide on which groups will have to be addressed.
- Mr. Moscaritola remarked that statements are made that people want to change things but we live in a town of 27,000 people and the Board holds meetings where no one attends. He indicated that the Board and Dr. Serafino have been very open and willing to listen and he hopes that 300 or 400 people attend the meeting on November 30.
- Mr. Moscaritola further noted that we all share the same common interest we all have a deep love for our children and community and it becomes very frustrating when only ten people attend a meeting.
- Mrs. Connie Alexis Laona, 36 Freeman Place, stated that she is receiving conflicting messages as to what the Board wants the public to do to make their voices heard and she asked what is the chain of command. Mr. Moscaritola responded that with a specific issue at a school a person should go to the building principal or teacher, adding that the Board meeting is the public forum.
- Mrs. Joan Rubino, 48 North Road, noted that she has been attending Board meetings for over 25 years and never saw Mr. Moscaritola at one meeting until he decided to run for the Board of Education and she asked where he was prior to that.
- Mrs. Rubino asked what the Board's policy was with regard to class participation. Dr. Serafino replied that there is no policy, adding that it is part of class performance and may count more in some classes than others. Mrs. Rubino remarked that extroverts seem to receive a lot more attention and they do better because they speak up, adding that a quiet child is punished for that type of personality and this should be addressed.
- Mrs. Barbara Bochese, 50 Cedar Street, indicated that people do not speak up at Board meetings for fear of reprisals against their children. She noted that there is a problem and it can be seen and heard in the frustration of people who come month after month because the Board is not listening and does not care. Mrs. Bochese offered her services as a public person anytime her help is needed.
- Mrs. Roncaglio stated that Mrs. Bochese is entitled to her opinion but Mrs. Roncaglio does not agree with it. She added that she rejects the notion that someone in a democratic society can give an opinion and then their children will be hurt. Mrs. Roncaglio commented that she finds it horrendous when someone can say that professional people will take it out on 5, 6, 7, 12 or 17 year olds. She added that she takes exception on behalf of the members of the teaching community and the Board.
- Mr. Jack Magnifico, 25 Chestnut Street, noted that he does not understand why additional classrooms are needed but he would like to see it publicized so the older people can know what is going on and vote on it.

Mrs. Kline indicated that she has been one of the people out and visible since 1994, speaking and writing, and she, personally, has the highest regard for the teachers in Spring Garden School, which her children attend, and has had a very positive experience with that. She added, however, that many people have spoken to her about their reluctance to speak at a public forum because they feel there is a danger to their children. Mrs. Kline noted that she has always replied that she has never felt that way and hopes that she never does.

Mrs. Kline stated that everywhere she goes people are always asking her about the grading system and she feels it is a very wide-spread issue but a lot of people are afraid to come forward.

Dr. Casale remarked that he had attended school with some of Mr. Magnifico's children, graduating in 1972 and having attended classes in Vincent Methodist Church because of the overcrowding. He noted that he had also had to deal with the earlier and later schedules. He indicated that in former years the district did not have the number of Basic Skills classes, special education program, ESL and AP courses, adding that we have expanded what we are doing and are running out of facilities.

Dr. Casale noted that as a Board member he feels there is an undercurrent that this is a done deal and he feels very sorry about that. He indicated that the Board has tried to communicate with parents and members of the community since the beginning but the process has just begun. Dr. Casale explained that thinking there would be a referendum in December was unrealistic thinking on the part of the Board since we are still collecting information and trying to reach a decision as a Board and community.

Mr. Moscaritola said that he feels that if Dr. Serafino had gone to the staff and then the public this would have been said to be a done deal.

Dr. Casale stated that the meeting with the architect on November 30 will allow the Board to obtain information on what the next step should be and how long things will take. He noted that all the meetings are open to the public and even though the public can't speak, you can see what is going on. Dr. Casale also commented that just because someone does not attend Board meetings does not mean the person is not very involved in the community and giving of their time.

Dr. Casale further stated that the point of going through a chain of command is that some issues can be corrected or addressed at a lower level; not every issue has to come before the Board but that does not mean that people should not come to the meetings. He added that the public has to have trust in the people they elected to the Board. Dr. Casale reiterated that the facilities issue is just at its beginning and he does not see the referendum getting to the voters before the school year ends.

Mrs. Umstadter noted that many people have difficulty finding time to attend Board meetings what with two people working and raising children

and suggested that there be specific meetings to deal with certain subjects and perhaps this would make it easier for people who can't go to every meeting.

Mr. Picciano noted that in light of the situation with people having limited time perhaps it would be an advantage if the Board published a new-letter on a monthly basis.

<u>Miss Ro Tangorra</u>, President of the Education Association of Nutley, read the following statement:

"The Representative Council of the Education Association of Nutley has established an official position on the possible reconfiguration of the Nutley School System.

"After a presentation by the 5th and 6th grade teachers the Representative Council voted unanimously to accept the recommendation of an overwhelming majority of the 5th and 6th grade teachers that 'The present grades remain in their respective buildings and keep the elementary community as it presently exists.'

"These are just a few of the statements expressed to the Representative Council by the 5th and 6th grade teachers:

"We are quite concerned for the social growth of the students under our care. Fifth and sixth graders are at a fragile age where they are still immature in many ways. They are quite impressionable, and if we can hold on to them for a couple of years more it can make all the difference.'

"There is also a safety issue involved. The young sixth graders must either walk to the Franklin School or be driven by their parents. Traffic on Franklin Avenue is congested and dangerous. To add more children, parents, and cars to an already overcrowded avenue would exacerbate the situation. The intermingling of seventh, eighth and sixth graders is another issue entirely.'

"The Nutley police would like to keep the students off Franklin Avenue for many reasons. They wish to control any loitering, illegal activities, and public nuisance problems. Adding more children to this already impossible task of control would not be advantageous. This sort of exposure for young children is not recommended and will not add to a positive educational experience.'

"The Representative Council also agreed with the 5th and 6th grade teachers who felt that the social and emotional aspects of a move to Franklin School for that age group now, in Nutley, would have a negative impact on any possible academic benefit and might prove to be an impediment to possible future development."

Mrs. Fleitell commented that it is very difficult to sit and listen to so many different opinions because the Board members have so many different opinions. She noted that her statement was going to be that no decision has been made and so anything that was heard on the street was inaccurate. Mrs. Fleitell said that to think the Board would ever make a decision such as this that would involve children from K-12 and great expense to the district without public input is insulting to the Board. She added that from her perspective the decision she has to make will be a very serious educational decision and there are pros and cons. Mrs. Fleitell stressed that a decision would never be made without discussing every single aspect of this issue.

Mrs. Fleitell continued by noting that there are still many questions to be answered and the meeting on November 30 is to teach the Board how to bring a referendum to the community and is another part of the Board's learning process. She indicated that there will be further input from the community before a final decision is made. Mrs. Fleitell also said that every Board member sitting at this table has children in the district and are two-parent working families as well, adding that she would never make a decision that would harm her children. She also stated that any decision she makes is in the best interest of the community.

Mrs. Russo commented that the Board received the EAN letter on November 8 and asked how many members were on the Representative Council to which Miss Tangorra replied 35 members represent each school and the warehouse. She added that the Council is comprised of teachers, secretaries and custodians.

Miss Tangorra explained that the fifth and sixth grade teachers were wondering if anyone was going to ask their opinion of a grade reconfiguration. She noted that the Representative Council voted unanimously to send the letter because those teachers deal with fifth and sixth graders every day and they were concerned.

Mrs. Chris Carlo, 57 Spruce Street, expressed her opinion that perhaps it would not be such a disadvantage to have the sixth grade in the middle school and perhaps the transition would not be too bad.

Miss Cynthia DeBonis, Franklin School teacher, stated that she wished to clarify some misconceptions that were being verbalized regarding the recent Halloween dance. She explained what was done to insure a safe, enjoyable evening for the students, adding that it was a wonderful experience for the children. Miss DeBonis invited the Board members to attend the Inaugural Ball which will take place at the end of January.

RECESS MEETING:

Mr. Moscaritola declared a recess at 9:33 p.m.

RESUME MEETING:

The meeting resumed at 9:45 p.m.

Mr. Sincaglia indicated that he had forgotten to make mention of Mr. Walker's request that he express his thanks to all those persons who had wished him well during his recent illness. He further stated that Mr. Walker hoped to return to work in the near future.

OLD BUSINESS:

Mr. Moscaritola stated that the Board needed to review the disenrollment letter that had been included in their packets and the process that would be followed. Board attorney Frank Vespa-Papaleo discussed the process that could be followed if people do not submit required documentation.

Mrs. Fleitell wanted to know at what point a person would actually be withdrawn and Mr. Vespa-Papaleo indicated it was essentially the 22nd day after the Board's official notice.

Mr. Vespa-Papaleo noted that the Board had the right to enforce its policy but also that the Board could determine residency by other evidence. During the discussion it was noted that there were now 19 families that had not complied with the Board's written and verbal requests.

Mrs. Russo wanted to know what happens if someone who lives in Nutley refuses to comply would that be reason enough to disenroll that person. Mr. Vespa-Papaleo said that the Board could provide additional time. Mrs. Russo noted that this was not part of existing Board policy but was based on a vote of the Board to initiate this action.

Dr. Casale asked a similar question relating to the possibility of a parent refusing to comply. Mr. Vespa-Papaleo said that noncompliance with the Board's directive was sufficient for the Board to proceed with disenrollment. Mr. Vespa-Papaleo said that, ultimately, if the parents do not want to provide any information they can swear out an affidavit.

It was determined that if the Board were to proceed with this the final date on which Board action would take place would be set as December 20.

Dr. Casale again asked if someone refuses to comply with the request could the Board take action. Mr. Vespa-Papaleo reiterated that the Board can proceed with disenrollment and the Board had discretion in how this would be done.

Mrs. Russo moved that the Board proceed with the distribution of the disenrollment letters to the affected individuals with the date for final determination to be December 20, 1999, seconded by Mr. Restaino and unanimously approved by the Board.

NEW BUSINESS:

RESOLUTION TO CLOSE MEETING TO THE PUBLIC:

Mr. Moscaritola asked Mr. Sincaglia to read the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Board of Education will be discussing matters exempt from public discussion pursuant to N.J.S.A. 10:4-12,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Education adjourn to closed executive session at this time to discuss personnel matters, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the results of the discussions will be made public by inclusion on the agenda of a subsequent meeting of the Board of Education or when the reasons for discussing such matters in closed session no longer exist.

Mrs. Russo moved that the resolution be adopted, seconded by Mrs. Fleitell and unanimously approved by the Board.
