# ANNUAL REPORT.

The census of children of school age for the past two years is as follows: 7896.—\$83 Children, increase 168 or 20 per cent.

1895.—815 children, increase 101, or 14 per cent.

The enrollment of pupils in school on March 1, 1897, was 501, increase 29 or 6 per cent. March 1, 1896, it was 472, increase of 118, or 33 1-3 per cent., which shows that this year the attendance has not increased proportionally with the enrollment, but indicates that during the two years the increase in attendance is fairly in proportion to the increase in the census. A rough estimate for the near future may now therefore be stated as follows:

We shall need to add as much as one new school room every two years. At this moderate rate of growth of the school facilities in proportion to the increase in wealth of the school district, it is reasonable to expect that the school-tax rate will be less, rather than greater in future years.

A large proportion of the Park improvement fund has been expended during the past year in building a permanent flagstone sidewalk the entire length of the main transverse road laid out by Mr. Vaux, continuing it entirely around the Park school building and connecting with the Town Hall. Aside from the convenience and comfort which this affords to the children, as well as to the citizens who pass through the Park, the clean walk has made a noticeable improvement in the cleanliness of the school rooms and The trustees hope to soon further develop Mr. Vaux's beautiful park plans by completing the terrace, and possibly the walk on the Franklin Avenue side.

Early in December last, diphtheria appeared among the children in this district to an extent that verged on epidemic, but, happily, did not become epidemic. The trustees invited the physicians to meet them. The invitation was courteously accepted and the meeting resulted in developing with reasonable accuracy the sources of infection of most of the ten cases. All the schools were closed for five days and measures, which proved to be entirely effective, were taken to prevent the spread of the disease among the school children. The effect of unnecessary fright upon the school attendance was marked, and about one-half the children remained out of school until after the holiday vacation. They lost time which can never be regained.

During the year no substantial change has been made in the course of study and only slight changes are in contemplation. More advanced courses should be added for those who are studiously inclined, but for the present it has been the aim to increase thoroughness in the branches now taught. The only changes immediately in view are of method only, with a view to securing better scholarship in grammar, language and literature.

A gratifying proof of the standing of the Franklin Public Schools is afforded by a recent order of the State Board which admits our graduates, to the two year course, without examination at the State Normal School, Trenton, N. J.

The adopted system of departmental teaching, described in the last report, is in full operation and has proved its value.

One hundred books and six periodicals have recently been added to the library. Due to the liberality of our own citizens in contributing a large sum each year, and aided by the State appropriation for this purpose, this library has already become a large and valuable one. Its increasing use shows that it is fully appreciated both by parents and children.

In discipline of unruly and indecent children our vigorous Principal has been cordially supported by the Trustees, with a result that there have been only two suspensions this year and the general discipline in the schools was never more satisfactory than it now is.
