At the beginning of the Fall term three additional classes were organized, two at the Park School and one at the Passaic Avenue School. A teacher of commercial subjects was also added to the High School corps.

There are now in constant use all the available class rooms in town, except the two at the Church Street School. This building has been closed since January, 1907. The problem of additional school accommodations in the eastern part of town is one to which I respectfully invite your attention during the coming year.

The special class for individual instruction at the Park School has fully justified its establishment, both when viewed in the light of the pupils directly benefited, and by the relief afforded the classes from which they are taken.

The work in manual training has grown in popularity and value, and continues to be a required subject of all pupils in the grammar grades. The points of contact between it and the other work of the school are made as many as possible.

The High School department has now passed the one hundred mark in enrolment, and will soon need larger accommodations. A departure was made this year in organizing a commercial course which now enrolls about one-fifth of the pupils. In this department a four-years course is offered.

Thus far during the year absences among the teachers have been very few, and in general the attendance among pupils has been regular.

I am confident that substantial work is being done in all classes, and that our teachers are devoted and earnest in the service given to our pupils and the town.
