THE PRESIDENT'S FOREWORD

We come again to the end of a successful school year. On the material side we feel that great progress has been made. In September we will have finished the remodeling and enlarging of the Yantacaw and Lincoln Schools. Reasonable provision has been made for the future of these buildings, since their capacity has been doubled, also facilities have been provided that will enable us to use them for any type of organization that seems best. We now have five excellent elementary school buildings and, in addition, our new high school building which has been a source of pride to our town since its erection two years ago.

Last year I called the attention of our citizens to the fact that even with the remodeling and enlargement of our elementary school buildings and the building of a new high school, our task is not yet done. The problem of our junior school is a pressing one. It is so overcrowded that several junior school classes must be held over in the elementary schools. At the same time our high school is rapidly approaching a crowded condition. It seems to the Board of Education that we shall have to take up this matter very soon.

The solution seems to be in the building of a junior high school building which will accommodate the ninth year of the high school as well as the seventh and eighth years of the present junior school. This building will need to be a large one, as there are at the present time about 1000 pupils in these groups. The problem is being studied. We hope to reach such a solution as will not only be economical but in the best interests of our growing boys and girls.

MEDICAL INSPECTION DEPARTMENT REPORT

For Year Ending June 21, 1929

Herewith is presented the report of the Medical Inspection Department for the year ending June 21, 1929:

The general health of the children was good until the last two months of the term, when mumps and measles were prevalent. There were 4,240 physical examinations made. Parents were notified of defects of their children. Approximately 500 homes have been visited for the purpose of checking reported illness, advising parents of the physical condition of their children, and urging the correction of minor cases. Cases of uncleanness number only a fraction of the number some years ago, and the same can be said of ringworm, scabies, eczema and impetigo. It may be said in this connection that results have been remarkable in securing parents' cooperation.

The system of building up the children who are underweight has been very successful. A chart is kept for each underweight child, and the children are weighed at stated intervals. Parents are urged to use more milk in food for these children, and the children are served milk each morning in school. Noticeable improvements have been shown in these instances.
