GOOD SCHOOLS DON'T JUST HAPPEN!


Good schools don't just happen! They are made to happen. In the past, the citizens of Nutley have provided a quality school district. If we are to maintain effectively the high educational standards that have been typical of this community, our schools must be well staffed by the best professionals available, and equipped

This year the Board of Education submits the 1964-65 budget for your consideration. This budget reflects the educational plan for Nutley school children.

We live in a changing world. Critical and crucial decisions have been and will have to be made by Nutley citizens, but none

will be more important than a decision about the continuation of a quality educational program in Nutley.

This budget maintains Nutley's quality educational program by providing for (1) individualized instruction and attempting to keep class size at the present levels (2) specialists to aid teachers, (3) educational programs to meet the needs of certain special groups (4) counseling and guidance programs (5)) a salary schedule which will attract and retain quality teachers, and (6) a continued policy of making school-plant repairs and improvements as needed to increase the schools' attractiveness, safety, and educational effectiveness.


